Smith v. Dial Finance Co.

85 Nev. 650 (1969) · Decided December 1, 1969

SUMMARY

The Nevada Supreme Court held that debtors who had filed a voluntary bankruptcy petition retained sufficient interest in a cause of action to assert a counterclaim before a bankruptcy trustee was appointed and qualified. The court reversed dismissal of the Smiths' counterclaim in Dial Finance's action on a promissory note.

QUESTIONS PRESENTED

- Whether debtors who have filed a voluntary bankruptcy petition but whose trustee has not yet been appointed retain a sufficient interest in a cause of action to prosecute that claim as a counterclaim.

HOLDINGS

1. A bankrupt debtor retains a sufficient interest in the bankruptcy estate to begin and prosecute a suit, including a counterclaim, during the period between filing the bankruptcy petition and the appointment and qualification of a trustee.

KEY QUOTATIONS

“Although Section 11 (c) of the Bankruptcy Act [11 U.S.C.A. § 29(c)] is silent as to the right of the bankrupt himself to begin a suit in the time which intervenes between the filing of a petition and the appointment and qualification of the trustee, the authorities declare that when that section is read in conjunction with Section 70(a) [11 U.S.C.A. § 110(a)] it is clear that the bankrupt retains a sufficient interest in his estate to begin such a suit.” (650-651)

FACTUAL BACKGROUND

Dial Finance Co. commenced an action against the Smiths to recover money due on a promissory note. The Smiths filed a counterclaim for damages one day after filing a voluntary petition for bankruptcy in federal court. At the time of the counterclaim, no bankruptcy trustee had been appointed.

PROCEDURAL HISTORY

Dial Finance Co. sued the Smiths on a promissory note. One day before filing their counterclaim for damages, the Smiths filed a voluntary bankruptcy petition, but no trustee had yet been appointed. The district court dismissed the counterclaim on the ground that the Smiths were not real parties in interest with standing to prosecute the claim. The Nevada Supreme Court reversed.
