

MASSACHUSETTS SUPREME JUDICIAL COURT

Foley v. Commonwealth

437 Mass. 1016 (2002) · Decided July 9, 2002

SUMMARY

The Massachusetts Supreme Judicial Court affirmed a single justice’s denial of the plaintiffs’ requests for mandamus, injunctive relief, and reconsideration. The court held that mandamus could not be used to compel or reverse interlocutory rulings by a Superior Court judge, particularly where adequate alternative remedies had not been shown, and noted the plaintiffs’ failure to comply with applicable procedural requirements.

PROCEDURAL POSTURE	The plaintiffs appealed to the full Supreme Judicial Court from a single justice's denial of an emergency motion seeking mandamus relief and from denial of reconsideration. The requested mandamus would have required reversal of interlocutory Superior Court rulings allowing defendants' motions to dismiss.
STANDARD OF REVIEW	The full court reviewed the single justice's denial of extraordinary mandamus relief for abuse of discretion and upheld the decision because mandamus was unavailable and the plaintiffs had adequate alternative remedies. The court also enforced the applicable procedural requirements for review of interlocutory rulings.

QUESTIONS PRESENTED

1. Whether mandamus could issue to require reversal of the Superior Court judge's interlocutory rulings on defendants' motions to dismiss.
2. Whether the plaintiffs were entitled to extraordinary interlocutory intervention or a stay of foreclosure-related proceedings.
3. Whether the plaintiffs' appeal from the single justice's denial of relief from interlocutory rulings was barred by failure to comply with S.J.C. Rule 2:21.

HOLDINGS

1. Mandamus is unavailable to direct a judicial officer to make a particular decision or to review or reverse a decision on an issue properly before that officer, particularly where the plaintiffs have not shown the absence of an adequate alternative remedy.
2. None of the plaintiffs' other claims warranted extraordinary interlocutory intervention by the single justice, and the plaintiffs had not shown why available appellate or statutory procedures could not provide the requested relief.
3. S.J.C. Rule 2:21 applied to the plaintiffs' challenge to relief from interlocutory Superior Court rulings, and the plaintiffs' failure to comply with that rule independently supported affirmance of the single justice's decision.

KEY QUOTATIONS

“The principal relief sought by the plaintiffs, mandamus, is “extraordinary and may be granted only to prevent a failure of justice in instances where there is no alternative remedy.”” (437 Mass. at 1017)

“Mandamus is not appropriate, however, “to direct a judicial officer to make a particular decision or to review, or reverse, a decision made by a judicial officer on an issue properly before him or her.”” (437 Mass. at 1017)

FACTUAL BACKGROUND

The plaintiffs alleged that state and local officials, mortgage lenders, and members of the bar conspired to impose unlawful property taxes and confiscate private property. After most defendants obtained dismissal of the complaint in the Superior Court, the plaintiffs sought emergency mandamus requiring the Superior Court judge to rule favorably on their claims and sought an order staying foreclosure and possession proceedings. The Superior Court case remained interlocutory because no final judgment had been entered.

PROCEDURAL HISTORY

The plaintiffs filed a civil-rights class-action complaint in the Superior Court alleging a conspiracy involving unlawful property taxes and confiscation of private property. Most defendants moved to dismiss, and those

motions were allowed, but no final judgment had entered. While the Superior Court action remained pending, the plaintiffs sought emergency mandamus and injunctive relief from a single justice of the Supreme Judicial Court; the motions and a subsequent motion for reconsideration were denied. The full court affirmed both denials.

DISPOSITION
