Nevin P. Cooper-Keel v. Jeremy Baier, et al.

SUMMARY

The United States District Court for the Western District of Michigan denied Nevin P. Cooper-Keel’s objections to a Magistrate Judge’s Report and Recommendation and adopted the recommendation as the court’s opinion. The court granted Defendant Carter Woodwyk’s motion for judgment on the pleadings, closed the case, and certified that an appeal would not be taken in good faith.

QUESTIONS PRESENTED

1. Whether Plaintiff's objections to the magistrate judge's Report and Recommendation warranted de novo review and rejection of the recommendation.
2. Whether Defendant Woodwyk was entitled to judgment on the pleadings because Plaintiff failed to plausibly allege malicious prosecution and due process claims.

HOLDINGS

1. Plaintiff's wholesale reiteration of his prior arguments did not identify any specific error in the magistrate judge's analysis and was insufficient to require meaningful de novo review.
2. Defendant Woodwyk was entitled to judgment on the pleadings because Plaintiff failed to plausibly allege either his malicious prosecution claim or his due process claim.

KEY QUOTATIONS

"Plaintiff states merely a "wholesale objection" to the Magistrate Judge's conclusions, which is insufficient for meaningful review by the Court." (PageID.427)

"In sum, Plaintiff's objections do not reveal any error in the Magistrate Judge's analysis." (PageID.427)

FACTUAL BACKGROUND

Plaintiff alleged malicious prosecution and due process violations based on a misdemeanor charge brought against him and later dismissed. The action was brought against Jeremy Baier, an Allegan County assistant prosecutor, and Carter Woodwyk, a Michigan Department of Natural Resources officer. Baier had already been dismissed, and the remaining claims against Woodwyk were found not to have been plausibly alleged.

PROCEDURAL HISTORY

Cooper-Keel brought claims for malicious prosecution and due process violations arising from a dismissed misdemeanor charge. Defendant Baier was dismissed previously. Defendant Woodwyk moved for judgment on the pleadings, and the magistrate judge recommended granting the motion because neither claim was plausibly alleged. The district court overruled Plaintiff's objections, adopted the Report and Recommendation, granted judgment on the pleadings, and directed that the case be closed.
