Matter of Johnson v. Annucci

SUMMARY

The New York Appellate Division, Fourth Department, reviewed an Article 78 proceeding challenging a tier III prison disciplinary determination. The court annulled findings that the petitioner violated rules concerning refusal of a direct order and interference with an employee, directed expungement of those violations, vacated the recommended loss of good time, and remitted for reconsideration based on the remaining urinalysis-testing violation.

QUESTIONS PRESENTED

1. Whether substantial evidence supported the determinations that Johnson violated inmate rules 106.10 and 107.10.
2. Whether substantial evidence supported the determination that Johnson violated inmate rule 180.14.
3. Whether the recommended two-month loss of good time should be vacated and remitted for reconsideration after two violations were annulled.

HOLDINGS

1. The findings that Johnson violated inmate rules 106.10 and 107.10 were not supported by substantial evidence and therefore had to be annulled.
2. Substantial evidence supported the determination that Johnson violated inmate rule 180.14.
3. The recommended two-month loss of good time had to be vacated and remitted to the respondent for reconsideration in light of the court's annulment of the rule 106.10 and 107.10 violations.

FACTUAL BACKGROUND

Following a tier III prison disciplinary hearing, Johnson was found to have violated inmate rules concerning refusal of a direct order, interference with an employee, and a urinalysis testing violation. The determination was affirmed on administrative appeal as to those charges. The record supported the urinalysis-testing violation but did not contain substantial evidence supporting the refusal-of-order and interference-with-an-employee violations.

PROCEDURAL HISTORY

Johnson commenced a CPLR article 78 proceeding seeking to annul a determination that he violated several inmate rules. One charge was dismissed on administrative appeal, but findings that he violated rules 106.10, 107.10, and 180.14 were affirmed. The Supreme Court, Wyoming County, transferred the proceeding to the Fourth Department, which partially annulled the determination, vacated the recommended loss of good time, ordered expungement of two violations, and remitted for reconsideration of the loss-of-good-time recommendation.

DISPOSITION

remanded

REMAND INSTRUCTIONS

Respondent must reconsider the recommended loss of good time in light of the court's decision concerning inmate rule 180.14. Respondent must also expunge from Johnson's institutional record all references to the violations of rules 106.10 and 107.10. The determination was otherwise confirmed without costs.
