

SUPREME COURT OF KENTUCKY

James B. Tennill, Sr. v. Cyrus M. Talai

277 S.W.3d 248 (Ky. 2009) · No. Nos. 2007-SC-000046-DG, 2007-SC-000673-DG · Decided February 19, 2009

SUMMARY

The Supreme Court of Kentucky addressed whether a trial court properly refused to set aside a default judgment and whether the plaintiff's failure to answer written interrogatories concerning unliquidated damages barred recovery. The court held that the default judgment was properly maintained, but that counsel's damages deposition and failure to pursue further clarification waived strict compliance with CR 8.01(2), making the discovery error harmless. The court affirmed in part and reversed in part the Court of Appeals and reinstated the trial court's damages award.

PROCEDURAL POSTURE	Tennill obtained a default judgment against Talai for personal injuries from a motor vehicle accident. The trial court denied Talai's motion to set aside the default and awarded Tennill \$45,076 in damages after a hearing. The Kentucky Court of Appeals affirmed the denial of relief from default but reversed the damages award under CR 8.01(2). The Supreme Court of Kentucky granted discretionary review and Talai filed a protective cross-motion.
STANDARD OF REVIEW	Abuse of discretion for the trial court's refusal to set aside the default; the Supreme Court reviewed the application of CR 8.01(2) and whether any discovery violation was harmless.

QUESTIONS PRESENTED

1. Whether the trial court abused its discretion by refusing to set aside the default judgment under CR 55.02.
2. Whether Tennill's failure to answer written interrogatories specifying his unliquidated damages barred recovery of those damages under CR 8.01(2).
3. Whether Talai waived strict compliance with CR 8.01(2), and whether Tennill's failure to answer the interrogatories was harmless, when Talai obtained discovery through Tennill's deposition concerning the amount and nature of the damages.

HOLDINGS

1. The trial court did not abuse its discretion by refusing to set aside the default because Talai failed to show good cause, including a meritorious defense.
2. A default admits liability but does not admit unliquidated damages; therefore, Talai was entitled to discovery concerning the amount of Tennill's damages.
3. Although CR 8.01(2) is strictly construed and an unanswered interrogatory concerning unliquidated damages ordinarily operates as an effective answer of zero, Tennill was not barred from recovering damages because Talai waived strict compliance and the omission was harmless under the circumstances.

KEY QUOTATIONS

“Good cause is not mere inattention on the part of the defendant (Appellee/Cross-Appellant), his attorney, or his insurance carrier.” (250)

“Therefore, we must reverse the Court of Appeals' opinion as to damages and reinstate the trial court's judgment, albeit on other grounds.” (250)

FACTUAL BACKGROUND

Tennill sought damages for personal injuries sustained in a motor vehicle accident and obtained a default judgment against Talai. Before the damages hearing, Talai served written interrogatories and deposed Tennill concerning the accident, injuries, medical treatment, prior accidents, and damages. Tennill did not answer the interrogatories, but he answered the deposition questions and stated that he was claiming medical expenses, lost wages, and pain and suffering, while his counsel communicated that Tennill was seeking the \$25,000 policy limits in settlement. Talai's counsel did not pursue further questions or investigation concerning the amount of damages.

PROCEDURAL HISTORY

The trial court entered default against Talai, denied his motion to set aside the default, and conducted a damages hearing. It permitted Tennill to introduce evidence of unliquidated damages despite his failure to answer written interrogatories concerning damages and entered judgment for \$45,076 plus costs. The Court of Appeals affirmed as to the default but reversed as to damages. The Supreme Court affirmed the denial of the motion to set aside the default, reversed the Court of Appeals' ruling on damages, and reinstated the trial court's judgment.

DISPOSITION

REMAND INSTRUCTIONS

The Court reinstated the trial court's judgment awarding Tennill \$45,076 plus costs; no further substantive remand instructions were stated.
