

NEW YORK SUPREME COURT

Raphael v. Herman

36 Misc. 2d 32 (1962) · Decided August 13, 1962

SUMMARY

The court reviewed an administrative determination ordering an increase in maximum rents under New York's rent law. It held that the sales price was an appropriate basis for calculating the hardship increase because the transaction was bona fide and reflective of value, and it upheld the finding that essential services were maintained. The petition was dismissed.

QUESTIONS PRESENTED

- Whether the Administrator properly used the property's sales price as the basis for calculating a hardship rent increase.
- Whether the record supported the finding that essential services were being maintained.

HOLDINGS

1. The Administrator properly used the sales price because the record supported the determination that the sale was bona fide, negotiated at arm's length, and not made solely to obtain rent increases; under the applicable statute, the sales price was therefore required to be used as the basis for calculating the increase.
2. The challenge to the determination failed because the Administrator's contrary finding regarding maintenance of essential services was supported by investigative reports and other evidence in the record.

KEY QUOTATIONS

“However, where the record does not disclose that purchaser and seller negotiated other than as adversary parties, each standing on his respective rights and neither under the other’s control, there is nothing to indicate that the seller received less, or the buyer paid more, than the fair value of the property.” (33)

“In such circumstance, the respondent is mandated by the Legislature to use the sales price as the basis for computation of increases.” (33)

FACTUAL BACKGROUND

The property was sold for \$527,353.46, with more than one-fourth paid in cash and the balance financed through assumed and newly executed mortgages. The Administrator found the sale bona fide based in part on the relationship between the purchase price and rent roll, the comparatively low rents, and the cash payment. The record also contained investigative reports and other evidence supporting the finding that essential services were being maintained.

PROCEDURAL HISTORY

The petitioner challenged the respondent Administrator's determination on the grounds that the property's sales price did not reflect true value and that essential services were not being maintained. The court found that the administrative determination was supported by the record and dismissed the petition.
