Jamal Logan v. Carrillo, et al.

SUMMARY

This document is a stipulated protective order entered in Jamal Logan’s civil rights action against California correctional defendants in the United States District Court for the Eastern District of California. It establishes procedures for designating, challenging, using, filing, and disposing of confidential discovery materials, including prison, personnel, medical, and security-related records. The parties’ stipulation is dated October 14, 2025, and the order states that it remains effective until further court order.

QUESTIONS PRESENTED

- Whether good cause supported entry of the parties' stipulated protective order under Federal Rule of Civil Procedure 26(c).
- Whether the protective order could authorize filing confidential material under seal without a separate request satisfying Eastern District of California Local Rule 141.

3. What procedures would govern challenges to confidentiality designations and the handling, use, and final disposition of protected discovery material.

HOLDINGS

1. The court entered the parties' stipulated protective order upon finding good cause.
2. The protective order did not itself authorize filing confidential material under seal; any party seeking to file such material under seal must comply with Eastern District of California Local Rule 141 and establish the applicable good-cause or compelling-reasons standard.

“The parties are advised that pursuant to the Local Rules of the United States District Court, Eastern District of California, any documents which are to be filed under seal will require a written request which complies with Local Rule 141;” (at 14)

“The party making a request to file documents under seal shall be required to show either good cause or compelling reasons to seal the documents, depending on the type of filing” (at 14)

FACTUAL BACKGROUND

The litigation is expected to involve peace-officer personnel records, prison records, medical records, internal and draft memoranda, deliberative-process materials, and other information potentially protected from public disclosure. The parties sought procedures governing designation, use, disclosure, challenges to confidentiality, and disposition of such discovery materials. The court also addressed the separate requirements for filing protected material under seal.

PROCEDURAL HISTORY

Plaintiff Jamal Logan brought a civil-rights action against Carrillo and other defendants. The parties submitted a stipulated protective order concerning confidential discovery materials, and the court entered the order after finding good cause.

14 Defendants. 15 16 The parties to this action, Plaintiff Jamal Logan and Defendants E. Carrillo,
M. Anito, and 17 D. Dugay, by and through their counsel, stipulate to the following protective
order.

This proposed 18 protective order is based on the Northern District's Model Stipulated Protective
Order for Standard 19 Litigation. 20 1. PURPOSES AND LIMITATIONS 21 Disclosure and
discovery activity in this action are likely to involve production of 22 confidential, proprietary, or
private information for which special protection from public disclosure 23 and from use for any
purpose other than prosecuting this litigation may be warranted.

Accordingly, 24 the parties hereby stipulate to and petition the court to enter the following
Stipulated Protective 25 Order. The parties acknowledge that this Order does not confer blanket
protections on all 26 disclosures or responses to discovery and that the protection it affords from
public disclosure and 27 use extends only to the limited information or items that are entitled to
confidential treatment under the applicable legal principles.

The parties further acknowledge, as set forth in Section 12.3, 1 below, that this Stipulated
Protective Order does not entitle them to file confidential information 2 under seal; Civil Local
Rule 141 sets forth the procedures that must be followed and the standards 3 that will be applied
when a party seeks permission from the court to file material under seal.

4 2. GOOD CAUSE STATEMENT 5 This action is likely to involve peace officer personnel
records, documents which 6 potentially reflect an entity's deliberative processes, internal and draft
memoranda, and prison 7 records for which special protection from public disclosure and from use
for any purpose other 8 than prosecution of this action is warranted. Such confidential and
proprietary materials and 9 information consist of, among other things, peace officer records,
documents which reflect an 10 entity's deliberative processes, internal and draft memoranda,
inmate prison records, medical 11 records, and information otherwise generally unavailable to the
public, or which may be privileged 12 or otherwise protected from disclosure under state or
federal statutes, court rules, case decisions, or 13 common law.

Accordingly, to expedite the flow of information, to facilitate the prompt resolution 14 of disputes
over confidentiality of discovery materials, to adequately protect information the 15 parties are
entitled to keep confidential, to ensure that the parties are permitted reasonable 16 necessary uses
of such material in preparation for and in the conduct of trial, to address their 17 handling at the
end of the litigation, and serve the ends of justice, a protective order for such 18 information is
justified in this matter.

It is the intent of the parties that information will not be 19 designated as confidential for tactical reasons and that nothing be so designated without a good 20 faith belief that it has been maintained in a confidential, non-public manner, and there is good 21 cause why it should not be part of the public record of this case. 22 3. DEFINITIONS 23 3.1. Challenging Party: a Party or Non-Party that challenges the designation of 24 information or items under this Order.

25 3.2. "CONFIDENTIAL" Information or Items: information (regardless of how it is 26 generated, stored or maintained) or tangible things that qualify for protection under Federal Rule of 27 Civil Procedure 26(c). 1 3.3. "CONFIDENTIAL—ATTORNEYS' EYES ONLY" Information or Items: 2 information (regardless of how it is generated, stored, or maintained) or tangible things that qualify 3 for production under Federal Rule of Civil Procedure 26(c), as specified above in the Good Cause 4 Statement, and constitutes or discloses information which threatens prison safety or security.

5 3.4. Counsel (without qualifier): Outside Counsel of Record and House Counsel (as well 6 as their support staff). 7 3.5. Designating Party: a party or Non-Party that designates information or items that it 8 produces in disclosures or in responses to discovery as "CONFIDENTIAL" of 9 "CONFIDENTIAL—ATTORNEYS' EYES ONLY." 10 3.6. Disclosure or Discovery Material: all items or information, regardless of the 11 medium or manner in which it is generated, stored, or maintained (including, among other things, 12 testimony, transcripts, and tangible things), that are produced or generated in disclosures or 13 responses to discovery in this matter.

14 3.7. Expert: a person with specialized knowledge or experience in a matter pertinent to 15 the litigation who has been retained by a Party or its counsel to serve as an expert witness or as a 16 consultant in this action. 17 3.8. House Counsel: attorneys who are employees of a party to this action. House 18 Counsel does not include Outside Counsel of Record or any other outside counsel.

19 3.9. Non-Party: any natural person, partnership, corporation, association, or other legal 20 entity not named as a Party to this action. 21 3.10. Outside Counsel of Record: attorneys who are not employees of a party to this 22 action but are retained to represent or advise a party to this action and have appeared in this action 23 on behalf of that party or are affiliated with a law firm which has appeared on behalf of that party.

24 3.11. Party: any party to this action, including all of its officers, directors, employees, 25 consultants, retained experts, and Outside Counsel of Record (and their support staffs). 26 3.12. Producing Party: a Party or Non-Party that produces Disclosures or Discovery 27 Material in this action. 1 3.13. Professional Vendors: persons or entities that provide litigation support services 2 (e.g., photocopying, videotaping, translating, preparing exhibits, or demonstrations, and 3 organizing, storing or retrieving data in any form or medium) and their employees and 4 subcontractors.

5 3.14. Protected Material: any Disclosure or Discovery Material that is designated as 6
“CONFIDENTIAL” or “CONFIDENTIAL—ATTORNEYS’ EYES ONLY.” 7 3.15. Receiving
Party: a Party that receives Disclosure or Discovery Material from a 8 Producing Party. 9 4.
SCOPE 10 The protections conferred by this Stipulation and Order cover not only Protected
Material 11 (as defined above), but also (1) any information copied or extracted from Protected
Material; (2) 12 all copies, excerpts, summaries, or compilations of Protected Material; and (3)
any testimony, 13 conversations, or presentations by Parties or their Counsel that might reveal
Protected Material.

14 However, the protections conferred by this Stipulation and Order do not cover the following 15
information: (a) any information that is in the public domain at the time of disclosure to a 16
Receiving Party or becomes part of the public domain after its disclosure to a Receiving Party as a
17 result of publication not involving a violation of this Order, including becoming part of the
public 18 record through trial or otherwise; and (b) any information known to the Receiving Party
prior to 19 the disclosure or obtained by the Receiving Party after the disclosure from a source
who obtained 20 the information lawfully and under no obligation of confidentiality to the
Designating Party.

Any 21 use of Protected Material at trial shall be governed by a separate agreement or order. 22 5.
DURATION 23 Even after final disposition of this litigation, the confidentiality obligations
imposed by this 24 Order shall remain in effect until a Designating Party agrees otherwise in
writing or a court order 25 otherwise directs. Final disposition shall be deemed to be the later of
(1) dismissal of all claims 26 and defenses in this action, with or without prejudice; and (2) final
judgment herein after the 27 completion and exhaustion of all appeals, rehearings, remands, trials,
or reviews of this action, including the time limits for filing any motions or applications for
extension of time pursuant to 1 applicable law.

2 6. DESIGNATING PROTECTED MATERIAL 3 6.1. Exercise of Restraint and Care in
Designating Material for Protection. Each Party or 4 Non-Party that designates information or
items for protection under this Order must take care to 5 limit any such designation to specific
material that qualifies under the appropriate standards.

The 6 Designating Party must designate for protection only those parts of material, documents,
items, or 7 oral or written communications that qualify – so that other portions of the material,
documents, 8 items, or communications for which protection is not warranted are not swept
unjustifiably within 9 the ambit of this Order. 10 Mass, indiscriminate, or routinized designations
are prohibited.

Designations that are 11 shown to be clearly unjustified or that have been made for an improper
purpose (e.g., to 12 unnecessarily encumber or retard the case development process or to impose
unnecessary expenses 13 and burdens on other parties) expose the Designating Party to sanctions.

14 If it comes to a Designating Party's attention that information or items that it designated for 15 protection do not qualify for protection, that Designating Party must promptly notify all other 16 Parties that it is withdrawing the mistaken designation.

17 6.2. Manner and Timing of Designations. Except as otherwise provided in this Order 18 (see, e.g., second paragraph of section 6.2(a) below), or as otherwise stipulated or ordered, 19 Disclosure or Discovery Material that qualifies for protection under this Order must be clearly so 20 designated before the material is disclosed or produced. 21 Designation in conformity with this Order requires: 22 (a) For information in documentary form (e.g., paper or electronic documents, but 23 excluding transcripts of depositions or other pretrial or trial proceedings), that the Producing Party 24 affix the legend "CONFIDENTIAL" or "CONFIDENTIAL—ATTORNEYS' EYES ONLY" to 25 each page that contains protected material.

If only a portion or portions of the material on a page 26 qualifies for protection, the Producing Party also must clearly identify the protected portion(s) 27 (e.g., by making appropriate markings in the margins). A Party or Non-Party that makes original 1 the inspecting Party has indicated which material it would like copied and produced. During the 2 inspection and before the designation, all of the material made available for inspection shall be 3 deemed "CONFIDENTIAL" or "CONFIDENTIAL—ATTORNEYS' EYES ONLY." After the 4 inspecting Party has identified the documents it wants copied and produced, the Producing Party 5 must determine which documents, or portions thereof, qualify for protection under this Order.

6 Then, before producing the specified documents, the Producing Party must affix the 7 "CONFIDENTIAL" or "CONFIDENTIAL—ATTORNEYS' EYES ONLY" legend to each page 8 that contains Protected Material. If only a portion or portions of the material on a page qualifies for 9 protection, the Producing Party also must clearly identify the protected portion(s) (e.g., by making 10 appropriate markings in the margins).

11 (b) for testimony given in deposition or in other pretrial or trial proceedings, that the 12 Designating Party identify on the record, before the close of the deposition, hearing, or other 13 proceeding, all protected testimony. 14 (c) for information produced in some form other than documentary and for any 15 other tangible items, that the Producing Party affix in a prominent place on the exterior of the 16 container or containers in which the information or item is stored the legend "CONFIDENTIAL" 17 or "CONFIDENTIAL—ATTORNEYS' EYES ONLY." If only a portion or portions of the 18 information or item warrant protection, the Producing Party, to the extent practicable, shall identify 19 the protected portion(s).

20 6.3. Inadvertent Failures to Designate. If timely corrected, an inadvertent failure to 21 designate qualified information or items does not, standing alone, waive the Designating Party's 22 right to secure protection under this Order for such material. Upon timely correction of a 23 designation,

the Receiving Party must make reasonable efforts to assure that the material is treated 24 in accordance with the provisions of this Order.

25 7. CHALLENGING CONFIDENTIALITY DESIGNATIONS 26 7.1. Timing of Challenges. Any Party or Non-Party may challenge a designation of 27 confidentiality at any time. Unless a prompt challenge to a Designating Party's confidentiality 1 burdens, or a significant disruption or delay of the litigation, a Party does not waive its right to 2 challenge a confidentiality designation by electing not to mount a challenge promptly after the 3 original designation is disclosed.

4 7.2. Meet and Confer. The Challenging Party shall initiate the dispute resolution process 5 by providing written notice of each designation it is challenging and describing the basis for each 6 challenge. To avoid ambiguity as to whether a challenge has been made, the written notice must 7 recite that the challenge to confidentiality is being made in accordance with this specific paragraph 8 of the Protective Order.

The parties shall attempt to resolve each challenge in good faith and must 9 begin the process by conferring directly (in voice to voice dialogue; other forms of communication 10 are not sufficient) within 14 days of the date of service of notice.

In conferring, the Challenging 11 Party must explain the basis for its belief that the confidentiality designation was not proper and 12 must give the Designating Party an opportunity to review the designated material, to reconsider the 13 circumstances, and, if no change in designation is offered, to explain the basis for the chosen 14 designation. A Challenging Party may proceed to the next stage of the challenge process only if it 15 has engaged in this meet and confer process first or establishes that the Designating Party is 16 unwilling to participate in the meet and confer process in a timely manner.

17 7.3. Judicial Intervention. If the Parties cannot resolve a challenge without court 18 intervention, the Designating Party shall file and serve a motion to retain confidentiality under 19 Civil Local Rule 230 (and in compliance with Civil Local Rule 141 and 141.1, if applicable) 20 within 21 days of the initial notice of challenge or within 14 days of the parties agreeing that the 21 meet and confer process will not resolve their dispute, whichever is earlier.

Each such motion must 22 be accompanied by a competent declaration affirming that the movant has complied with the meet 23 and confer requirements imposed in the preceding paragraph. Failure by the Designating Party to 24 make such a motion including the required declaration within 21 days (or 14 days, if applicable) 25 shall automatically waive the confidentiality designation for each challenged designation.

In 26 addition, the Challenging Party may file a motion challenging a confidentiality designation at any 27 time if there is good cause for doing so, including a challenge to the designation of a deposition transcript or any portions thereof. Any motion brought pursuant to this provision must

be 1 accompanied by a competent declaration affirming that the movant has complied with the meet 2 and confer requirements imposed by the preceding paragraph.

3 The burden of persuasion in any such challenge proceeding shall be on the Designating 4 Party. Frivolous challenges, and those made for an improper purpose (e.g., to harass or impose 5 unnecessary expenses and burdens on other parties) may expose the Challenging Party to 6 sanctions. Unless the Designating Party has waived the confidentiality designation by failing to file 7 a motion to retain confidentiality as described above, all parties shall continue to afford the 8 material in question the level of protection to which it is entitled under the Producing Party's 9 designation until the court rules on the challenge.

10 8. ACCESS TO AND USE OF PROTECTED MATERIAL 11 8.1. Basic Principles. A Receiving Party may use Protected Material that is disclosed or 12 produced by another Party or by a Non-Party in connection with this case only for prosecuting, 13 defending, or attempting to settle this litigation. Such Protected Material may be disclosed only to 14 the categories of persons and under the conditions described in this Order.

When the litigation has 15 been terminated, a Receiving Party must comply with the provisions of section 14 below (FINAL 16 DISPOSITION). 17 Protected Material must be stored and maintained by a Receiving Party at a location and in 18 a secure manner that ensures that access is limited to the persons authorized under this Order. 19 8.2. Disclosure of "CONFIDENTIAL" Information or Items.

Unless otherwise ordered 20 by the court or permitted in writing by the Designating Party, a Receiving Party may disclose any 21 information or item designated "CONFIDENTIAL" only to: 22 (a) the Receiving Party's Outside Counsel of Record in this action, as well as 23 employees of said Outside Counsel of Record to whom it is reasonably necessary to disclose the 24 information for this litigation and who have signed the "Acknowledgment and Agreement to Be 25 Bound" that is attached hereto as Exhibit A; 26 (b) the officers, directors, and employees (including House Counsel) of the Receiving 27 Party to whom disclosure is reasonably necessary for this litigation and who have signed the 1 (c) Experts (as defined in this Order) of the Receiving Party to whom disclosure is 2 reasonably necessary for this litigation and who have signed the "Acknowledgment and 3 Agreement to Be Bound" (Exhibit A); 4 (d) the court and its personnel; 5 (e) court reporters and their staff, professional jury or trial consultants, mock jurors, 6 and Professional Vendors to whom disclosure is reasonably necessary for this litigation and who 7 have signed the "Acknowledgment and Agreement to Be Bound" (Exhibit A); 8 (f) during their depositions, witnesses in the action to whom disclosure is reasonably 9 necessary and who have signed the "Acknowledgment and Agreement to Be Bound" (Exhibit A), 10 unless otherwise agreed by the Designating Party or ordered by the court.

Pages of transcribed 11 deposition testimony or exhibits to depositions that reveal Protected Material must be separately 12 bound by the court reporter and may not be disclosed to anyone except as permitted under this 13 Stipulated Protective Order. 14 (g) the author or recipient of a document containing the information or a custodian or 15 other person who otherwise possessed or knew the information.

16 Subject to the exception found at subsection 8.2(g), “CONFIDENTIAL” or 17 “CONFIDENTIAL—ATTORNEYS’ EYES ONLY” information or documents shall not be 18 provided to any prisoner, including Plaintiff Jamal Logan or anyone associated with any inmate 19 including Plaintiff Logan. 20 9. PROTECTED MATERIAL SUBPOENAED OR ORDERED PRODUCED IN OTHER 21 LITIGATION 22 If a Party is served with a subpoena or a court order issued in other litigation that compels 23 disclosure of any information or items designated in this action as “CONFIDENTIAL” or 24 “CONFIDENTIAL—ATTORNEYS’ EYES ONLY,” that Party must: 25 (a) promptly notify in writing the Designating Party.

Such notification shall include 26 a copy of the subpoena or court order; 27 (b) promptly notify in writing the party who caused the subpoena or order to issue 1 this Protective Order. Such notification shall include a copy of this Stipulated Protective Order; 2 and 3 (c) cooperate with respect to all reasonable procedures sought to be pursued by the 4 Designating Party whose Protected Material may be affected.

5 If the Designating Party timely seeks a protective order, the Party served with the subpoena 6 or court order shall not produce any information designated in this action as “CONFIDENTIAL” 7 or “CONFIDENTIAL—ATTORNEYS’ EYES ONLY” before a determination by the court from 8 which the subpoena or order issued, unless the Party has obtained the Designating Party’s 9 permission.

The Designating Party shall bear the burden and expense of seeking protection in that 10 court of its confidential material – and nothing in these provisions should be construed as 11 authorizing or encouraging a Receiving Party in this action to disobey a lawful directive from 12 another court. 13 10. A NON-PARTY’S PROTECTED MATERIAL SOUGHT TO BE PRODUCED IN THIS 14 LITIGATION 15 (a) The terms of this Order are applicable to information produced by a Non-Party in this 16 action and designated as “CONFIDENTIAL” or “CONFIDENTIAL—ATTORNEYS’ EYES 17 ONLY.” Such information produced by Non-Parties in connection with this litigation is protected 18 by the remedies and relief provided by this Order.

Nothing in these provisions should be construed 19 as prohibiting a Non-Party from seeking additional protections. 20 (b) In the event that a Party is required, by a valid discovery request, to produce a Non- 21 Party’s confidential information in its possession, and the Party is subject to an agreement with the 22 Non-Party not to produce the Non-Party’s confidential information, then the Party shall: 23 (1) promptly notify in writing the Requesting Party and the Non-Party that some or

24 all of the information requested is subject to a confidentiality agreement with a Non-Party; 25 (2) promptly provide the Non-Party with a copy of the Stipulated Protective Order 26 in this litigation, the relevant discovery request(s), and a reasonably specific description of the 27 information requested; and 1 (c) If the Non-Party fails to object or seek a protective order from this court within 14 days 2 of receiving the notice and accompanying information, the Receiving Party may produce the Non- 3 Party's confidential information responsive to the discovery request.

If the Non-Party timely seeks 4 a protective order, the Receiving Party shall not produce any information in its possession or 5 control that is subject to the confidentiality agreement with the Non-Party before a determination 6 by the court. Absent a court order to the contrary, the Non-Party shall bear the burden and expense 7 of seeking protection in this court of its Protected Material.

8 11. UNAUTHORIZED DISCLOSURE OF PROTECTED MATERIAL 9 If a Receiving Party learns that, by inadvertence or otherwise, it has disclosed Protected 10 Material to any person or in any circumstance not authorized under this Stipulated Protective 11 Order, the Receiving Party must immediately (a) notify in writing the Designating Party of the 12 unauthorized disclosures, (b) use its best efforts to retrieve all unauthorized copies of the Protected 13 Material, (c) inform the person or persons to whom unauthorized disclosures were made of all the 14 terms of this Order, and (d) request such person or persons to execute the "Acknowledgment and 15 Agreement to Be Bound" that is attached hereto as Exhibit A. 16 12.

INADVERTENT PRODUCTION OF PRIVILEGED OR OTHERWISE PROTECTED 17 MATERIAL 18 When a Producing Party gives notice to Receiving Parties that certain inadvertently 19 produced material is subject to a claim of privilege or other protection, the obligations of the 20 Receiving Parties are those set forth in Federal Rule of Civil Procedure 26(b) (5)(B). This provision 21 is not intended to modify whatever procedure may be established in an e-discovery order that 22 provides for production without prior privilege review.

Pursuant to Federal Rule of Evidence 23 502(d) and (e), insofar as the parties reach an agreement on the effect of disclosure of a 24 communication or information covered by the attorney-client privilege or work product protection, 25 the parties may incorporate their agreement in the stipulated protective order submitted to the 26 court. 27 13. MISCELLANEOUS 1 13.1.

Right to Further Relief. Nothing in this Order abridges the right of any person to 2 seek its modification by the court in the future. 3 13.2. Right to Assert Other Objections. By stipulating to the entry of this Protective 4 Order no Party waives any right it otherwise would have to object to disclosing or producing any 5 information or item on any ground not addressed in this Stipulated Protective Order.

Similarly, no 6 Party waives any right to object on any ground to use in evidence of any of the material covered by 7 this Protective Order. 8 13.3. Filing Protected Material. Without written permission from the Designating Party or 9 a court order secured after appropriate notice to all interested persons, a Party may not file in the 10 public record in this action any Protected Material.

A Party that seeks to file under seal any 11 Protected Material must comply with Civil Local Rule 141. Protected Material may only be filed 12 under seal pursuant to a court order authorizing the sealing of the specific Protected Material at 13 issue. Pursuant to Civil Local Rule 141, a sealing order will issue only upon a request establishing 14 that the Protected Material at issue is privileged, protectable as a trade secret, or otherwise entitled 15 to protection under the law.

If a Receiving Party's request to file Protected Material under seal 16 pursuant to Civil Local Rule 141 is denied by the court, then the Receiving Party may file the 17 information in the public record pursuant to Civil Local Rule 141 unless otherwise instructed by 18 the court. 19 14. FINAL DISPOSITION 20 Within 60 days after the final disposition of this action, as defined in Section 5, each 21 Receiving Party must return all Protected Material to the Producing Party or destroy such material.

22 As used in this subdivision, "all Protected Material" includes all copies, abstracts, compilations, 23 summaries, and any other format reproducing or capturing any of the Protected Material. Whether 24 the Protected Material is returned or destroyed, the Receiving Party must submit a written 25 certification to the Producing Party (and, if not the same person or entity, to the Designating Party) 26 by the 60 day deadline that (1) identifies (by category, where appropriate) all the Protected 27 Material that was returned or destroyed and (2) affirms that the Receiving Party has not retained any copies, abstracts, compilations, summaries or any other format reproducing or capturing any of 1 the Protected Material.

Notwithstanding this provision, Counsel are entitled to retain an archival 2 copy of all pleadings, motion papers, trial, deposition, and hearing transcripts, legal memoranda, 3 correspondence, deposition and trial exhibits, expert reports, attorney work product, and consultant 4 and expert work product, even if such materials contain Protected Material. Any such archival 5 copies that contain or constitute Protected Material remain subject to this Protective Order as set 6 forth in Section 5 (DURATION).
