In re Childers

273 Ga. 337 (2001) · Decided January 8, 2001

SUMMARY

The Supreme Court of Georgia accepted Dennis S. Childers' petition for voluntary discipline after he admitted abandoning or disregarding client matters and failing to respond to disciplinary authorities. The Court imposed a six-month suspension, backdated to December 1, 1999, when Childers had been placed under interim suspension, citing mitigating circumstances including his lack of prior discipline, cooperation, remorse, and serious personal and emotional problems.

QUESTIONS PRESENTED

1. Whether the Supreme Court of Georgia should accept Childers' petition for voluntary discipline based on his admitted violations of Standards 44 and 68.
2. What discipline should be imposed, including whether the suspension should be backdated to the date of Childers' interim suspension.

HOLDINGS

1. The Court accepted Childers' petition for voluntary discipline after considering his admitted violations, mitigating circumstances, and the absence of aggravating factors.
2. Childers was suspended from the practice of law for six months, with the suspension backdated to December 1, 1999, the date of his interim suspension.

KEY QUOTATIONS

"Accordingly, it hereby is ordered that Childers be suspended from the practice of law for a period of six months." (338)

FACTUAL BACKGROUND

In one matter, Childers failed to respond to discovery requests in a lawsuit against General Motors Acceptance Corporation, resulting in dismissal after his clients did not timely respond to the dismissal motion. In another matter, he failed to respond to Ford Motor Company's summary-judgment motion, failed to appear at the hearing, and did not return his client's calls or requests for her case file. Childers admitted violating disciplinary Standards 44 and 68 and asserted mitigating circumstances including no prior disciplinary record, cooperation, remorse, and serious personal and emotional problems.

PROCEDURAL HISTORY

Two disciplinary matters were pending against Childers. He admitted violating Standards 44 and 68 of Bar Rule 4-102 (d), proposed a six-month suspension, and requested that it be backdated to the date of his interim suspension. The State Bar had no objection, and the Supreme Court of Georgia accepted the petition and imposed the requested six-month suspension, backdated to December 1, 1999.
