Darryl Hammer v. Commissioner of Social Security

SUMMARY

The United States District Court for the Northern District of Ohio reviewed the Commissioner of Social Security’s denial of Darryl Hammer’s applications for Supplemental Security Income and Disability Insurance Benefits. The court rejected challenges concerning an alleged conflict between the residual functional capacity and vocational-expert testimony and the evaluation of State agency psychological opinions. The court affirmed the Commissioner’s nondisability determination and dismissed the complaint.

QUESTIONS PRESENTED

1. Whether the ALJ's step-five finding was unsupported because the identified jobs required depth perception allegedly inconsistent with Hammer's limitation against work requiring binocular vision.
2. Whether the ALJ improperly evaluated the State agency psychological consultants' findings and thereby adopted a mental residual functional capacity unsupported by substantial evidence.

HOLDINGS

1. The ALJ did not err in finding that Hammer could perform the identified jobs. The DOT's depth-perception requirements did not create an apparent conflict with the vocational expert's testimony because the expert testified that the jobs could be performed within the RFC, and Hammer failed to identify record evidence establishing an actual depth-perception limitation.
2. The ALJ reasonably evaluated the State agency psychological consultants' opinions and permissibly limited Hammer to occasional interaction with supervisors, coworkers, and the general public, while requiring superficial interaction only with coworkers and the public.

FACTUAL BACKGROUND

Hammer alleged disability based principally on lumbar and thoracic spine impairments, left-eye vision loss, and post-traumatic stress disorder. Medical records reflected degenerative spinal changes, left-eye visual impairment, and some psychological symptoms, but also generally normal strength, intact sensation, cooperative presentation, and no reported interpersonal conflicts with supervisors or coworkers in his past employment. The ALJ limited Hammer to light work with postural, environmental, monocular-vision, and social-interaction restrictions, and relied on vocational-expert testimony identifying three jobs available in significant numbers.

PROCEDURAL HISTORY

Hammer applied for DIB and SSI, alleging disability beginning June 1, 2020. The applications were denied initially and on reconsideration; after a February 22, 2024 hearing, the ALJ found that Hammer was not disabled. The Appeals Council denied further review on April 22, 2025, making the ALJ's decision final. Hammer filed this action on May 30, 2025, and the parties completed briefing. The court affirmed the Commissioner's decision and dismissed the complaint.
