Patillo v. State

2015 Ark. 441 (2015) · No. CR-15-381 · Decided December 3, 2015

SUMMARY

The Supreme Court of Arkansas affirmed Adrian Patillo's convictions for two counts of capital murder and possession of a controlled substance. The court held that the circuit court did not abuse its discretion by limiting Patillo's recross-examination of a witness where the proposed questioning would have repeated inconsistencies already addressed during cross-examination. The court also found no prejudicial error under Arkansas Supreme Court Rule 4-3(i).

QUESTIONS PRESENTED

1. Whether the circuit court abused its discretion by limiting Patillo's recross-examination of a witness after the State questioned the witness on redirect about the consistency between his recorded statement and trial testimony.

HOLDINGS

1. The circuit court did not abuse its discretion by limiting Patillo's recross-examination because the proposed questioning merely repeated inconsistencies already explored during cross-examination and did not seek new information.

FACTUAL BACKGROUND

On May 26, 2012, Patillo went to Marky Dee's in Pine Bluff, Arkansas, left after becoming upset, obtained a gun, returned, and shot Jennifer Wainwright and Marcus Thorns. Jeremy Parker witnessed the shootings and gave a recorded statement to police before testifying at trial. During cross-examination, Patillo's counsel identified inconsistencies between Parker's recorded statement and trial testimony concerning whether Odail ran toward a lake or a field after the shootings; on redirect, the State questioned Parker about whether the statements were consistent, and the circuit court limited recross-examination to avoid repetition.

PROCEDURAL HISTORY

A Jefferson County Circuit Court jury convicted Patillo of two counts of capital murder, and Patillo pleaded guilty to one count of possessing a controlled substance. The circuit court imposed life imprisonment without parole for each capital-murder conviction and twenty-five years' imprisonment for possession, with the sentences running concurrently. The Supreme Court of Arkansas affirmed.
