

APPELLATE TERM OF THE SUPREME COURT OF NEW YORK

239 East 115th Street HDFC v. Olunkunle

29 Misc. 3d 64 (App. Term 2010) · Decided August 31, 2010

SUMMARY

The court reversed an order denying a tenant’s motion concerning a settlement stipulation and remanded for a hearing to determine the parties’ intent regarding the ambiguous phrase “subject premises” and the applicable rent. It affirmed the denial of the tenant’s contempt motion because the stipulation and subsequent order did not contain a clear and unequivocal mandate requiring relocation to a one-bedroom apartment at a specified rent.

PROCEDURAL POSTURE	Tenant moved to reform a so-ordered stipulation of settlement based on alleged mutual mistake and later moved to hold the landlord in contempt. Civil Court denied both motions. The Appellate Term reversed the order denying reformation, vacated that determination, and remanded for a hearing and a new determination; it affirmed the order denying contempt.

QUESTIONS PRESENTED

1. Whether the tenant was entitled to reformation of the settlement stipulation based on alleged mutual mistake.

2. Whether the stipulation was ambiguous as to the meaning of the phrase "subject premises" and therefore required an evidentiary hearing regarding the parties' intent.
3. Whether the landlord could be held in contempt for failing to relocate the tenant to a one-bedroom apartment at the rent claimed by the tenant.

HOLDINGS

1. The tenant's requested relief was not true reformation because he sought resolution of an ambiguity and enforcement of the stipulation according to his interpretation, rather than adding an omitted term or removing an inadvertently included term.
2. Because the stipulation was susceptible to more than one reasonable interpretation of the phrase "subject premises," it was ambiguous, requiring a hearing to determine the parties' intent and a new determination of the tenant's motion.
3. The contempt motion was properly denied because neither the stipulation nor the subsequent court order contained a clear and unequivocal mandate requiring the landlord to relocate the tenant to a one-bedroom apartment at a particular rent.

KEY QUOTATIONS

"Since the stipulation is, on its face, susceptible to more than one reasonable interpretation, it is ambiguous and a hearing is required to ascertain the intent of the parties regarding the meaning of the phrase "subject premises" in paragraph five" (66)

"Neither the stipulation nor a subsequent order of the court requiring landlord to relocate tenant in accordance with the stipulation expressed "a clear . . . [and] unequivocal mandate" to landlord to relocate tenant to a one-bedroom apartment at a particular rent" (67)

FACTUAL BACKGROUND

The landlord leased the tenant a two-bedroom apartment at a monthly rent of \$215. Their nonpayment proceeding was resolved by a 2006 stipulation under which the tenant could remain until a satisfactory one-bedroom apartment became available, while paragraph five set rent at 30% of income or \$215, whichever was higher. After the landlord offered a one-bedroom apartment, the parties disagreed whether paragraph five established the rent for the existing two-bedroom unit or the replacement one-bedroom unit.

PROCEDURAL HISTORY

The landlord commenced a nonpayment summary proceeding in 2004. The parties entered into a so-ordered settlement stipulation on January 24, 2006. After the landlord offered a one-bedroom apartment and the parties disputed the rent applicable to that apartment, the tenant sought reformation and contempt relief. Civil Court denied both motions, leading to the appeal.

DISPOSITION

reversed_and_remanded

REMAND INSTRUCTIONS

Conduct a hearing to ascertain the parties' intent regarding the meaning of "subject premises" in paragraph five of the stipulation and make a new determination of the tenant's motion. The order denying contempt was affirmed.
