West v. Thompson

No. 19-31039, United States Court of Appeals for the Fifth Circuit (January 29, 2021)

SUMMARY

West v. Thompson, 5th Cir. (2021) (unpublished) – Prisoner §1983 action alleging Eighth Amendment violations from double-celling policy in administrative segregation/protective custody and excessive force. The district court granted summary judgment for defendant Thompson (no personal involvement, policy not unconstitutional) and dismissed claims against Hunt for failure to effect timely service. The Fifth Circuit denied IFP and dismissed the appeal as frivolous because the appellant abandoned challenges to the district court's rulings and failed to raise nonfrivolous issues. Key topics: Eighth Amendment, double-celling, summary judgment, IFP, frivolous appeal, abandonment of claims.

P. 56(a): 'if the pleadings and evidence show there is no genuine issue of material fact and the moving party is entitled to judgment as a matter of law.'

QUESTIONS PRESENTED

1. Whether the district court erred in granting summary judgment to Thompson on the double-celling policy claim.
2. Whether the district court erred in dismissing claims against Hunt for failure to effect timely service.
3. Whether West's challenge to the lack of direct personal involvement by Thompson regarding the use of force was properly rejected.

HOLDINGS

1. The policy of double-celling inmates in administrative segregation on protective custody is not unconstitutional under *Rhodes v. Chapman* and *Bell v. Wolfish*. West failed to demonstrate a nonfrivolous issue for appeal on this claim.
2. West abandoned any challenge to the dismissal of Hunt by not addressing it on appeal.
3. West abandoned any challenge to this determination by not addressing it on appeal.

FACTUAL BACKGROUND

West, a Louisiana prisoner at Louisiana State Penitentiary in Angola, brought a 42 U.S.C. § 1983 action against prison officials Darian Thompson and Richard Hunt. He alleged that the defendants violated the Eighth Amendment by adopting a policy of double-celling inmates in administrative segregation on protective custody. He also alleged that excessive force was used against him by another correctional officer when he refused to return to his cell due to threats from his cellmate. The district court granted partial summary judgment to Thompson on the double-celling claim and dismissed Hunt for failure to effect timely service.

PROCEDURAL HISTORY

The district court granted partial summary judgment to Thompson on the Eighth Amendment double-celling claim and dismissed Hunt for failure to effect timely service. West appealed. The district court certified the

appeal as not in good faith. West moved to proceed IFP on appeal.

DISPOSITION
