United States v. Juvenal Delbosque

SUMMARY

In this unpublished Fifth Circuit per curiam opinion, the court granted appointed counsel's motion to withdraw under **Anders v. California**, 386 U.S. 738 (1967), after finding no nonfrivolous issues for appellate review. The defendant did not respond to the motion. The court dismissed the appeal pursuant to Fifth Circuit Rule 42.2.

HOLDINGS

1. The court concurs with counsel's assessment that the appeal presents no nonfrivolous issue for appellate review.

KEY QUOTATIONS

"We concur with counsel's assessment that the appeal presents no nonfrivolous issue for appellate review."
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"Accordingly, counsel's motion for leave to withdraw is GRANTED, counsel is excused from further responsibilities herein, and the APPEAL IS DISMISSED." (Page 2)

FACTUAL BACKGROUND

The opinion does not discuss the underlying facts of the case. It is a per curiam order granting counsel's motion to withdraw and dismissing the appeal as frivolous.

PROCEDURAL HISTORY

The defendant appealed his conviction. The Federal Public Defender appointed to represent him moved to withdraw pursuant to *Anders v. California*, 386 U.S. 738 (1967), and filed a brief stating that the appeal presented no nonfrivolous issues.
