Griffin v. State

SUMMARY

The Delaware Supreme Court affirmed the Superior Court’s resentencing of Tyerin Griffin as a habitual offender. Applying Delaware Supreme Court Rule 26(c), the Court concluded that Griffin’s appeal was wholly without merit and that appointed counsel had conscientiously reviewed the record and law.

PROCEDURAL POSTURE	Appeal from the Superior Court's order granting the State's motion to designate Griffin a habitual offender under the prior version of 11 Del. C. § 4214(a) and resentencing him to an aggregate of 90 years of incarceration; Griffin's appointed counsel filed a Rule 26(c) motion to withdraw and a no-merit brief.
STANDARD OF REVIEW	Under Delaware Supreme Court Rule 26(c), appointed counsel must make a conscientious examination of the record and law for arguably appealable claims, and the Supreme Court independently reviews the record to determine whether the appeal is so devoid of arguably appealable issues that it may be decided without adversary presentation.

QUESTIONS PRESENTED

1. Whether Griffin's appeal presented any arguably appealable issue after appointed counsel's conscientious review of the record and filing of a Rule 26(c) no-merit brief.
2. Whether the Superior Court's resentencing under the version of 11 Del. C. § 4214(a) in effect when Griffin committed the offenses was legally erroneous.

HOLDINGS

1. When counsel files a motion to withdraw and a no-merit brief under Rule 26(c), the Supreme Court must determine both whether counsel conscientiously examined the record and law for arguably appealable claims and whether the appeal is wholly devoid of at least arguably appealable issues.
2. The appeal presented no arguably appealable issue concerning Griffin's resentencing under the prior version of the habitual-offender statute, and the Superior Court's judgment was affirmed.

KEY QUOTATIONS

“First, the Court must be satisfied that defense counsel has made a conscientious examination of the record and the law for claims that could arguably be raised on appeal. Second, the Court must conduct its own review of the record and determine whether the appeal is so totally devoid of at least arguably appealable issues that it can be decided without an adversary presentation.” (¶ 5)

“The Court has reviewed the record carefully and has concluded that Griffin’s appeal is wholly without merit and devoid of any arguably appealable issues.” (¶ 6)

FACTUAL BACKGROUND

In 2016, Griffin was indicted for murder-related, firearm, reckless-endangering, and prohibited-person firearm offenses. He was convicted of manslaughter, first-degree reckless endangering, two counts of possession of a firearm during the commission of a felony, and possession of a firearm by a person prohibited. After the State conceded that Griffin should have been sentenced under the habitual-offender statute in effect when he committed the offenses, the Superior Court resentenced him to the statutory minimum aggregate term of 90 years.

PROCEDURAL HISTORY

A Superior Court jury convicted Griffin of manslaughter, first-degree reckless endangering, and two counts of possession of a firearm during the commission of a felony, and the trial judge convicted him of possession of a firearm by a person prohibited. The Superior Court initially sentenced him as a habitual offender to an aggregate

of 90 years, and the Delaware Supreme Court affirmed on direct appeal. After Griffin moved under Superior Court Criminal Rule 35 to correct an allegedly illegal sentence, the State conceded that the version of the habitual-offender statute in effect when he committed the offenses applied. The Superior Court resentenced Griffin under that version to the statutory minimum aggregate sentence of 90 years, and this appeal followed.
