Kareem Al-Jaml Young v. B. M. Trate

Young v. Trate · No. 1:23-cv-00055-TLN-CDB (HC) · Decided June 16, 2025

SUMMARY

The United States District Court for the Eastern District of California recommends dismissing Kareem Al-Jaml Young’s petition for a writ of habeas corpus under 28 U.S.C. § 2241 for lack of jurisdiction. The court concludes that Young’s challenges to his federal sentence must be pursued under 28 U.S.C. § 2255 in the sentencing court and that he has not shown unusual circumstances permitting resort to § 2241. The court also declines to transfer the petition because substantially identical claims were already pending in the Northern District of Alabama.

PROCEDURAL POSTURE	A federal prisoner filed a petition under 28 U.S.C. § 2241 challenging the validity of his federal conviction and sentence. The magistrate judge issued findings and recommendations that the petition be dismissed for lack of jurisdiction, subject to review by the assigned district judge after any objections.
STANDARD OF REVIEW	On preliminary screening, a habeas petition may be summarily dismissed if it plainly appears that the petitioner is not entitled to relief. A petition should not be dismissed without leave to amend unless no tenable claim for relief could be pleaded. Jurisdiction under § 2241 was reviewed under the statutory framework governing the § 2255 savings clause.

QUESTIONS PRESENTED

1. Whether the Eastern District of California had jurisdiction under 28 U.S.C. § 2241 to consider a federal prisoner's challenge to the validity of his federal conviction and sentence.
2. Whether petitioner demonstrated that the remedy under 28 U.S.C. § 2255 was inadequate or ineffective because unusual circumstances made it impossible or impracticable to seek relief in the sentencing court.
3. Whether the pending § 2255 proceedings in the Northern District of Alabama made transfer of the § 2241 petition appropriate under 28 U.S.C. § 1631.

HOLDINGS

1. The Eastern District of California lacked jurisdiction because petitioner did not establish that the § 2255 remedy was inadequate or ineffective within the meaning of the savings clause.
2. Petitioner's inability to satisfy the requirements for a successive § 2255 motion based on his Erlinger claim did not permit him to proceed under § 2241.
3. Transfer was not in the interests of justice because petitioner was already litigating substantially identical claims in the Northern District of Alabama, making transfer futile.

KEY QUOTATIONS

“The inability of a prisoner with a statutory claim to satisfy those conditions does not mean that he can bring his claim in a habeas petition under the saving clause. It means that he cannot bring it at all.” (at 6)

FACTUAL BACKGROUND

Petitioner was convicted in the Northern District of Alabama of possessing a firearm as a prohibited person under 18 U.S.C. § 922(g)(1) and was sentenced to 188 months based in part on an Armed Career Criminal Act enhancement. The sentencing court treated two Alabama robbery convictions and an unlawful-distribution conviction as ACCA predicate offenses. On direct appeal, petitioner challenged only the denial of counsel's request to withdraw, and the Eleventh Circuit affirmed. He later filed § 2255 motions in the sentencing court asserting that his ACCA enhancement was invalid and raising additional claims, while his § 2241 petition in the Eastern District of California challenged the use of his unlawful-distribution conviction as an ACCA predicate.

PROCEDURAL HISTORY

Petitioner was convicted and sentenced in the United States District Court for the Northern District of Alabama and his conviction and sentence were affirmed on direct appeal by the Eleventh Circuit. He filed this § 2241 petition in the Eastern District of California before filing a § 2255 motion in the sentencing court. He later filed

first, supplemental, and amended § 2255 motions in the Northern District of Alabama, which remained pending. The magistrate judge recommended dismissal of the § 2241 petition because the petitioner failed to establish that § 2255 was inadequate or ineffective and because transfer would be futile.

Respondent. 21-day Deadline 16 17 Petitioner Kareem Al-Jaml Young (“Petitioner”) is a federal
prisoner proceeding pro se and in 18 forma pauperis with a petition for writ of habeas corpus
pursuant to 28 U.S.C. § 2241.1 Petitioner 19 seeks review of his custody and vacatur of the

judgment and sentence imposed on him by the United States District Court for the Northern District of Alabama.

21 Background 22 On July 28, 2020, Petitioner was charged by superseding indictment with one count (“Count 23 One”) of violation of 18 U.S.C. § 922(g)(1) - Possession of a Firearm by a Prohibited Person. See 24 United States v. Young, No. 7:17-cr-00522-AMM-HNJ (N.D. Ala.) [Doc. 76].2 On April 15, 2021, 25 26 1 At the time he commenced this action, Petitioner was housed at USP-Atwater, in the Eastern.

27 District of California. See (Doc. 1 at 17). 28 2 Petitioner was charged with the same offense in the original indictment, to which he pleaded guilty but subsequently was permitted to withdraw his plea. This and other aspects of the earlier 1 Petitioner entered a guilty plea to Count One. (Docket entry dtd. 4/15/2021).

On May 25, 2021, 2 Petitioner appeared for sentencing on Count One and was sentenced to 188 months to run concurrently 3 with two state court-imposed judgments. (Docket entry dtd. 5/25/2021; Doc. 135). In connection with 4 Petitioner’s sentencing, the district court rejected Petitioner’s argument that he did not have three prior 5 convictions for crimes of violence or serious drug offenses for purposes of the Armed Career Criminal 6 Act (“ACCA”).

(Doc. 179-1 at 17). Specifically, the district court found that the ACCA sentencing 7 enhancement applied because Petitioner’s two Alabama robbery convictions and his conviction for 8 unlawful distribution of a controlled substance qualified as predicate offenses under the ACCA. Id. 9 In his direct appeal, Petitioner did not challenge any aspect of his conviction or argue that he 10 did not qualify for sentencing under the ACCA, as he had in the district court.

Instead, he raised only 11 the issue of whether the district court erred when it refused to let retained counsel withdraw prior to 12 sentencing. Id. at 18. In an unpublished, per curiam opinion issued September 25, 2023, the Eleventh 13 Circuit Court of Appeals rejected Petitioner’s challenge and affirmed the district court’s conviction 14 and sentence. See generally United States v. Young, No. 21-11907, 2023 WL 6213488 (11th Cir.

Sept. 15 25, 2023). 16 Before the Eleventh Circuit issued its order on Petitioner’s direct appeal and before filing in 17 the Northern District of Alabama any motion to vacate sentence pursuant to 28 U.S.C. § 2255, on 18 January 12, 2023, Petitioner filed the instant § 2241 petition in this Court. 19 Petitioner initiated in the Northern District of Alabama his now-pending first, supplemental, 20 and amended motions to vacate sentence pursuant to 28 U.S.C. § 2255, filed November 4 and 21 November 18, 2024, and April 11, 2025, respectively.

See Young v. United States, No. 7:24-cv- 22 08024-AMM (N.D. Ala.) (the “§ 2255 Action”) [Docs. 1, 4, 16]. In his original and supplemented § 23 2255 motions, Petitioner argues that he is “actually innocent” of the ACCA sentencing enhancement 24 in that his prior state law conviction

for robbery no longer qualifies as an ACCA-eligible predicate 25 “violent felony.” See the § 2255 Action [Docs.

1, 4]. In support of his argument, Petitioner relies on 26 the U.S. Supreme Court’s opinion in *Erlinger v. United States*, 602 U.S. 821 (2024), and a decision of 27 28 proceedings in Petitioner’s underlying criminal case are not at issue in this habeas corpus proceeding and, thus, not recounted herein. 1 the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals’ issued prior to Petitioner’s sentencing, *United States v. Walton* 2 (881 F.3d 768, Feb.

1, 2018). In his more recent amended motion, Petitioner asserts additional claims 3 in support of habeas relief, including that his sentence runs afoul of *New York State Rifle & Pistol 4 Assoc. v. Bruen*, that his attorney during sentencing was ineffective, and that the sentencing judge was 5 biased. See the § 2255 Action [Doc. 16]. 6 Notably, Petitioner has not raised in any of his § 2255 motions any challenge that his 7 conviction for unlawful distribution of a controlled substance qualified as a predicate offense under the 8 ACCA.

9 Petitioner’s Claims 10 In the instant petition, Petitioner argues that he is “actually innocent” of the ACCA sentencing 11 enhancement in that his prior state law conviction for unlawful distribution of controlled substances 12 (cocaine) did not qualify as an ACCA-eligible predicate “serious drug offense.” (Doc. 1 at 2-3).³ In a 13 filing titled “Supplemental Information” dated March 25, 2024, Petitioner cites additional cases in 14 support of his argument concerning his prior state law conviction for unlawful distribution of 15 controlled substances, and purports to assert three additional “Grounds” for relief that he raises in the 16 § 2255 Action, including the claim pursuant to the Supreme Court’s *Erlinger* decision.

(Doc. 15). In 17 his most recent filing, dated September 14, 2024, and titled “2241 Supplemental Information” (Doc. 18 17), Petitioner again advances the *Erlinger* decision as a basis for habeas relief in this Court. 19 Preliminary Screening Requirement 20 Rule 4 of the Rules Governing § 2254 Cases requires the Court to conduct a preliminary 21 review of each petition for writ of habeas corpus.⁴ Pro se habeas corpus petitions are to be liberally 22 construed.

Haines v. Kerner, 404 U.S. 519, 520-21 (1972). However, the Court must dismiss a 23 petition “[i]f it plainly appears from the petition...that the petitioner is not entitled to relief.” Habeas 24 Rule 4; *Hendricks v. Vasquez*, 908 F.2d 490, 491 (9th Cir. 1990). Habeas Rule 2(c) requires that a 25 26 3 References to Petitioner’s petition and related filings cite the CM/ECF-assigned page 27 number.

28 4 The Rules Governing § 2254 cases in the United States Courts (Habeas Rules) are appropriately applied to proceedings undertaken pursuant to 28 U.S.C. § 2241. Habeas Rule 1(b). 1 petition 1) specify all grounds of relief available to the Petitioner; 2) state the facts supporting

each 2 ground; and 3) state the relief requested. Notice pleading is not sufficient; rather, the petition must 3 state facts that point to a real possibility of a constitutional error.

Mayle v. Felix, 545 U.S. 644, 655 4 (2005) (“Habeas Corpus Rule 2(c) is more demanding”). Allegations in a petition that are vague, 5 conclusory, or palpably incredible are subject to summary dismissal. Hendricks, 908 F.2d at 491. A 6 petition for habeas corpus should not be dismissed without leave to amend “unless it appears that no 7 tenable claim for relief can be pleaded were such leave to be granted.” Jarvis v. Nelson, 440 F.2d 13, 8 14 (9th Cir.

1971) (per curiam). 9 Jurisdiction 10 In general, a federal prisoner who wishes to challenge the validity or constitutionality of his 11 federal conviction or sentence must do so by way of a motion to vacate, set aside, or correct the 12 sentence under 28 U.S.C. § 2255. Stephens v. Herrera, 464 F.3d 895, 897 (9th Cir. 2006), cert. 13 denied, 549 U.S. 1313 (2007); Tripathi v. Henman, 843 F.2d 1160, 1162 (9th Cir.

1988). In such cases, 14 only the sentencing court has jurisdiction. Tripathi, 843 F.2d at 1163; Hernandez v. Campbell, 204 15 F.3d 861, 864 (9th Cir. 2000). 16 At the time Petitioner filed his petition, courts recognized an exception to this general rule by 17 which a federal prisoner could challenge the validity or constitutionality of his federal conviction or 18 sentence under § 2241, referred to as the “savings clause” or “escape hatch” of § 2255, with the filing 19 of a § 2241 petition in the district of the petitioner’s confinement.

See Harrison v. Ollison, 519 F.3d 20 952, 956 (9th Cir. 2008). Under the § 2255 escape hatch, “a federal prisoner may file a § 2241 21 petition if, and only if, the remedy under § 2255 is ‘inadequate or ineffective to test the legality of his 22 detention.’” Marrero v. Ives, 682 F.3d 1190, 1192 (9th Cir. 2012) (quoting Stephens, 464 F.3d at 23 897).

In the Ninth Circuit, a remedy is not deemed “inadequate or ineffective” merely because § 24 2255’s gatekeeping provisions prevent the petitioner from filing a second or successive petition. Ivy v. 25 Pontesso, 328 F.3d 1057, 1059 (9th Cir. 2003); accord Moore v. Reno, 185 F.3d 1054, 1055 (9th Cir. 26 1999) (per curiam) (§ 2255 not inadequate or ineffective simply because the district court dismissed 27 the § 2255 motion as successive and court of appeals did not authorize a successive motion).

Instead, 28 prior to 2023, § 2255 was deemed to provide an “inadequate and ineffective” remedy (and, thus, 1 permit a petitioner to proceed under Section 2241 in the district of confinement) when the petitioner: 2 (1) makes a claim of actual innocence; and (2) has never had an “unobstructed procedural shot” at 3 presenting the claim. Harrison, 519 F.3d at 959; Stephens, 464 F.3d at 898; accord Marrero, 682 F.3d 4 at 1192.

The petitioner bears the burden to show that a remedy under § 2255 is inadequate or 5 ineffective. Redfield v. United States, 315 F.2d 76, 83 (9th Cir. 1963). If a petitioner fails to meet this 6

burden, then his § 2241 petition must be dismissed for lack of jurisdiction. *Ivy*, 328 F.3d at 1060. 7 In June 2023, the Supreme Court held in *Jones v. Hendrix* that § 2255(e) only “preserves 8 recourse to § 2241 in cases where unusual circumstances make it impossible or impracticable to seek 9 relief in the sentencing court.” 599 U.S. 465, 478 (2023).

The court noted that § 2255(h) specifies the 10 two limited circumstances permitting a federal prisoner to bring a second or successive collateral 11 attack on his sentence: (1) where new evidence clearly and convincingly shows no reasonable 12 factfinder could find the movant guilty; and (2) a new rule of constitutional law, previously 13 unavailable, could apply retroactively to the movant’s case.

See *id.* at 480; 28 U.S.C. § 2255(h). In 14 significantly narrowing the ambit of § 2241, the Court held that “[t]he inability of a prisoner with a 15 statutory claim to satisfy those conditions does not mean that he can bring his claim in a habeas 16 petition under the saving clause. It means that he cannot bring it at all.” *Jones*, 599 U.S. at 480. 17 Relatedly, a court of confinement lacks jurisdiction over a § 2241 petition where the petitioner 18 files it before he files a § 2255 motion raising the same claims in the district of conviction.

See *United 19 States v. Pirro*, 104 F.3d 297, 299 (9th Cir. 1997) (noting that a contrary rule “would eviscerate our 20 goal of judicial economy by engaging the attention of two courts on the same case at the same time”). 21 Discussion and Analysis 22 Petitioner fails to provide an adequate petition for writ of habeas corpus and fails to establish 23 this Court possesses jurisdiction over his “escape hatch” claim.

24 Specifically, Petitioner fails to demonstrate “unusual circumstances” that “make it impossible 25 or impracticable to seek relief in the sentencing court.” *Jones*, 599 U.S. at 478. The undersigned 26 acknowledges that Petitioner’s claim for relief advanced pursuant to the Supreme Court’s 2024 27 decision in *Erlinger* was not available until after he was convicted and sentenced and after the 28 Eleventh Circuit had rejected his direct appeal.

However, as in *Jones*, Petitioner’s inability previously 1 to raise his *Erlinger* claim to satisfy either of the § 2255(h) conditions does not mean that he can bring 2 his claim in a habeas petition under the saving clause; instead, it means “that he cannot bring it at all.” 3 *Jones*, 599 U.S. at 480. 4 With respect to his other claims for relief asserted in his original petition and supplements 5 (Docs.

1, 15, 17), Petitioner does not argue and cannot demonstrate unusual circumstances exist (such 6 as, for instance, his inability to advance his claims in the Northern District of Alabama) such that this 7 Court may consider his § 2241 petition.

As to the single claim in his original petition that his prior 8 state law conviction for unlawful distribution of controlled substances did not qualify as an ACCA- 9 eligible predicate “serious drug offense,” Petitioner did not seek relief on this ground in either his 10 direct appeal or the still-

pending § 2255 Action. See Ivy, 328 F.3d at 1060 (finding that failure to 11 assert habeas claim either in the petitioner's direct appeal or initial § 2255 motion such that claim was 12 procedurally barred "does not mean that § 2255's remedy was 'inadequate or ineffective.'").

The 13 other claims set forth in his supplements to the original petition in this Court all are claims before the 14 district court in the Northern District of Alabama in the pending § 2255 Action. 15 Therefore, Petitioner's § 2241 petition does not fit within the exception to the general bar 16 against using § 2241 to collaterally attack a conviction or sentence imposed by a federal court and 17 must be dismissed for lack of jurisdiction.

18 * * * * * 19 Had Petitioner not previously filed § 2255 motions in the Northern District of Alabama that are 20 still pending, the undersigned could construe the petition here as a § 2255 motion and transfer it to that 21 district (the only court to possibly have jurisdiction over Petitioner's habeas claims). But since 22 Petitioner still is litigating his pending claims in the § 2255 Action that are mostly identical to those 23 asserted here, transfer would not be in the interests of justice because it would be futile.

Accordingly, 24 the undersigned will recommend that the petition be dismissed for lack of jurisdiction. Cf. Miller v. 25 Hambrick, 905 F.2d 259, 262 (9th Cir.1990) (under 28 U.S.C. § 1631, if a district court finds it lacks 26 jurisdiction, it must transfer habeas corpus proceeding to the appropriate court when such transfer is in 27 the interests of justice).

28 /// 1 || Conclusion and Recommendations 2 Based on the foregoing, the undersigned RECOMMENDS that Petitioner's petition for writ o 3 || habeas corpus be dismissed for lack of jurisdiction. 4 These Findings and Recommendations will be submitted to the U.S. District Judge assigned to 5 || this case, pursuant to the provisions of 28 U.S.C. § 636(b)(1). Within 21 days after being served with 6 copy of these Findings and Recommendations, any party may file written objections with the Court 7 || Local Rule 304(b).

The document should be captioned, "Objections to Magistrate Judge's Findings 8 || and Recommendations" and shall not exceed 15 pages without leave of Court and good cause shown 9 || The Court will not consider exhibits attached to the Objections.

To the extent any party wishes to 10 || refer to any exhibit(s), that party should reference the exhibit in the record by its CM/ECF document 11 || and page number, when possible, or otherwise reference the exhibit with specificity. Any pages filed 12 || in excess of the 15-page limitation may be disregarded by the District Judge when reviewing these 13 || Findings and Recommendations under 28 U.S.C. § 636(b)(1)(C).

A party's failure to file any 14 || objections within the specified time may result in the waiver of certain rights on appeal. Wilkerson v. 15 || Wheeler, 772 F.3d 834, 839 (9th Cir. 2014) (citing Baxter v. Sullivan, 923 F.2d 1391, 1394 (9th Cir. 16 || 1991)). '7 ||lvP Is SO ORDERED. 18 || } :)
