People v. Waver

3 N.Y.3d 748, 821 N.E.2d 934 (2004) · Decided November 23, 2004

SUMMARY

The New York Court of Appeals held that the trial court erred by allowing undercover officers to testify anonymously without requiring the People to establish a need for anonymity. Applying the sequential inquiry required by *People v. Stanard*, the court concluded that the error was reversible because the anonymous witness’s testimony was central to the prosecution’s case and the effect on cross-examination was speculative. The order of the Appellate Division was reversed and a new trial was ordered.

PROCEDURAL POSTURE	Defendant was convicted after a bench trial and appealed the denial of his confrontation-related objection to anonymous testimony by undercover police officers. The Appellate Division affirmed, and the New York Court of Appeals reversed and ordered a new trial.
STANDARD OF REVIEW	The court reviewed whether the trial court properly applied the required sequential inquiry governing anonymous witness testimony and whether the resulting confrontation error could be deemed harmless.

PRACTICE AREAS

QUESTIONS PRESENTED

1. Whether the trial court erred by allowing undercover officers to testify anonymously without first requiring the People to demonstrate a need for anonymity.
2. Whether the failure to conduct the required anonymity inquiry was harmless despite the Appellate Division's conclusion that defendant suffered no confrontation prejudice.

HOLDINGS

1. Before permitting the People to shield a witness's identity, address, or occupation, the trial court must conduct the sequential three-step inquiry established in *People v. Stanard*: the People must first show why the witness should be excused from answering, the defense must then demonstrate the requested information's materiality to guilt or innocence, and the court must finally balance the defendant's cross-examination rights against the witness's interest in anonymity.
2. When the requirements of *People v. Stanard* have not been met, harmless-error treatment is not warranted where the anonymous witness's testimony is central to the People's case and the effect of the witness's anonymity on the defendant's ability to cross-examine is purely speculative.

KEY QUOTATIONS

"The sequential three-step inquiry mandated by Stanard was not undertaken, and this is reversible error." (at 750)

"When the requirements of Stanard have not been met, a finding of harmless error is not warranted where, as here, the testimony of the anonymous witness is central to the People's case and defendant's ability to cross-examine the anonymous witness is purely speculative." (at 750)

FACTUAL BACKGROUND

Defendant allegedly sold cocaine to an undercover officer during a buy-and-bust operation. The undercover buyer testified at defendant's bench trial anonymously, identified only by shield number and command; two other undercover officers also testified under their undercover numbers. The trial court denied defendant's request to require the People to justify withholding the officers' names and allowed the anonymous testimony.

PROCEDURAL HISTORY

Defendant was arrested and indicted after an undercover cocaine purchase and was denied suppression. He waived a jury trial and was convicted after a bench trial in which the undercover buyer and other officers testified by shield number rather than name. The Appellate Division affirmed, although it agreed that the trial court should have required the People to show a need for anonymity. The Court of Appeals reversed and ordered a new trial.
