SUMMARY

The United States District Court for the Western District of Washington granted Jeffrey Hill’s motion to remand his putative class action alleging violations of Washington’s Equal Pay and Opportunities Act pay-transparency requirements. The court held that Hill’s allegations of viewing a job posting and applying without interviewing, negotiating salary, or experiencing other concrete harm did not establish Article III standing. The court remanded the action to King County Superior Court because it was not absolutely certain that Washington state courts would dismiss the claims.

QUESTIONS PRESENTED

1. Whether Hill alleged an injury in fact sufficient to establish Article III standing.
2. Whether the absence of Article III standing required remand of the removed action to state court.
3. Whether the narrow futility exception permitted the federal court to dismiss rather than remand because a Washington state court would necessarily dismiss the action.
4. Whether the court should reach defendants' arguments concerning CAFA and diversity jurisdiction.

HOLDINGS

1. Hill lacked Article III standing because his complaint alleged only a statutory violation and did not allege concrete harm beyond applying for a job without interviewing, negotiating salary, or otherwise experiencing injury.
2. When a removed case lacks Article III standing and therefore lacks federal subject-matter jurisdiction, the district court must remand the case to state court.
3. The court declined to dismiss under the futility exception because it was not absolutely certain that a Washington state court would dismiss Hill's claims after remand.

FACTUAL BACKGROUND

Hill brought a putative class action under Washington's Equal Pay and Opportunities Act, alleging that Airgas USA LLC, Airgas Specialty Products, Inc., and Airgas Safety, Inc. failed to disclose required wage and compensation information in a job posting. Hill applied for the job but did not interview, engage in salary negotiations, or otherwise experience concrete harm. Defendants removed the action to federal court under CAFA and diversity jurisdiction.

PROCEDURAL HISTORY

Hill filed the action in King County Superior Court on July 22, 2025, alleging violations of Washington's Equal Pay and Opportunities Act pay-transparency provision. Defendants removed the action on August 12, 2025, invoking CAFA and diversity jurisdiction. The federal court granted Hill's motion to remand because he had not alleged a concrete injury sufficient for Article III standing and because dismissal under the futility exception was not warranted.

DISPOSITION

REMAND INSTRUCTIONS

All claims brought by Hill were remanded to the Superior Court of King County, Washington. The clerk was directed to mail a certified copy of the order to the state-court clerk, transmit the record, and close the federal case after remand.

case is one of many putative class actions brought under the pay transparency 16 provisions of
Washington’s Equal Pay and Opportunities Act (EPOA), RCW 49.58.110.

That 17 statute requires employers to disclose in their job postings “the wage scale or salary
range” and 18 “a general description of all of the benefits and other compensation to be offered to
the hired 19 applicant.” RCW 49.58.110(1).

Before the Court is plaintiff Jeffrey Hill’s (“Hill”) motion to 20 remand this case to the Superior
Court of King County, Washington. Dkt. 11. Because Hill lacks 21 standing under Article III of the
U.S. Constitution to pursue his claims in federal court—but may 22 pursue them in Washington
state court—the motion is GRANTED, and this case is 23 REMANDED to King County Superior
Court.

24 1 II. BACKGROUND Hill initially filed his complaint against defendants Airgas USA, LLC;
Airgas Specialty 2 Products, Inc.; and Airgas Safety, Inc. (collectively “Defendants”) in King
County Superior 3 Court on July 22, 2025. Dkt. 1-2 at 1. Hill alleges that Defendants violated
RCW 49.58.110(1), 4 the provision of Washington’s Equal Pay and Opportunities Act that requires
certain employers 5 to disclose in their job postings the “wage scale or salary range” and a
“general description of all 6 the benefits and other compensation to be offered to the hired
applicant.” Dkt.

1-2 at 1–3. This 7 requirement is intended to reduce pay inequality based on protected characteristics by increasing 8 transparency at the outset of the application process. See RCW 49.58.005. 9 Defendants removed the case to federal court on August 12, 2025, contending that this 10 Court has jurisdiction under 28 U.S.C. § 1332(d), the Class Action Fairness Act of 2005 11 (“CAFA”) and 28 U.S.C. § 1332(a), diversity jurisdiction.

Dkt. 1 at 3. Hill filed the instant 12 motion to remand on September 3, 2025. Dkt. 11. Defendants responded on September 24, 2025. 13 Dkt. 14. Hill replied on October 1, 2025. Dkt. 16. 14 III. LEGAL STANDARDS 15 A. Standing 16 Article III of the U.S. Constitution limits the Court’s jurisdiction to “Cases” and 17 “Controversies.” U.S. Const. art. III, § 2.

For a case or controversy to exist, the party bringing 18 the case must have standing. *Perry v. Newsom*, 18 F.4th 622, 630 (9th Cir. 2021). Standing is “an 19 indispensable part of the plaintiff’s case... [and] must be supported in the same way as any 20 other matter on which the plaintiff bears the burden of proof.” *Lujan v. Defs. of Wildlife*, 21 504 U.S. 555, 561 (1992).

22 The “irreducible constitutional minimum” of Article III standing requires the plaintiff to 23 show these three elements: “(1) [the plaintiff] suffered an injury-in-fact, (2) that is fairly 24 1 traceable to the challenged conduct of the defendant, and (3) that is likely to be redressed by a 2 favorable judicial decision.” *Spokeo v. Robins*, 578 U.S. 330, 338 (2016) (citations omitted).

3 “[S]tanding is not dispensed in gross; rather, plaintiffs must demonstrate standing for each claim 4 that they press and for each form of relief that they seek (for example, injunctive relief and 5 damages).” *TransUnion LLC v. Ramirez*, 594 U.S. 413, 431 (2021). 6 When a defendant removes a case to federal court but the plaintiff lacks Article III 7 standing, the district court must remand the case to state court.

Polo v. Innoventions Int’l, LLC, 8 833 F.3d 1193, 1196 (9th Cir. 2016); see 28 U.S.C. § 1447(c) (“If at any time before final 9 judgment it appears that the district court lacks subject matter jurisdiction, the case shall be 10 remanded.”). 11 B. Removal Under the Class Action Fairness Act of 2005 (“CAFA”) 12 “CAFA gives federal courts jurisdiction over certain class actions, defined in 13 [28 U.S.C.] § 1332(d)(1), if the class has more than 100 members, the parties are minimally 14 diverse, and the amount in controversy exceeds \$5 million.” *Dart Cherokee Basin Operating Co., LLC v. Owens*, 574 U.S. 81, 84–85 (2014) (citing 28 U.S.C. § 1332(d)(2), (5)(B)).

There is 16 “no antiremoval presumption” in “cases invoking CAFA” jurisdiction.” *Id.* at 89. If a plaintiff 17 challenges removal under CAFA, the defendant must establish, “by the preponderance of the 18 evidence, that the amount in controversy exceeds the jurisdictional threshold.” *Id.* at 88 (quoting 19 28 U.S.C. § 1446(c)(2)(B)). But “[t]he rule that a removed case in which the plaintiff lacks 20 Article III standing must be remanded to state court under § 1447(c) applies as well to a case 21 removed pursuant to CAFA as to any other type of removed case.” *Polo*, 833 F.3d at 1196.

22 IV. DISCUSSION In support of his motion to remand this case to King County Superior Court, Hill makes 23 three arguments: First, because Hill does not have Article III standing, the Court never had 24 1 subject matter jurisdiction, Dkt. 11 at 3–10; second, Defendants have not satisfied the 2 requirements for CAFA jurisdiction, id. at 10–12; and lastly, Defendants have not established 3 diversity jurisdiction, id. at 12–15.

4 A. Standing 5 Hill argues that this case must be remanded because Defendants cannot establish subject 6 matter jurisdiction. Id. at 3–10. Hill contends that while his complaint pleads a violation of the 7 EPOA, he does not allege the type of concrete harm resulting from the violation that would be 8 required to satisfy Article III standing and bring the case in federal court.

See id. at 5–6. Because 9 without standing he could not have originally filed suit in federal court, Defendants are similarly 10 prohibited from invoking this Court’s subject matter jurisdiction through removal. See id. at 4; 11 28 U.S.C. § 1441 (granting removal jurisdiction over “any civil action brought in a State court of 12 which the district courts of the United States have original jurisdiction”).

To support his 13 argument, Hill provides a long list of cases brought under RCW 49.58.110 with similar facts that 14 other courts in this District have remanded. Dkt. 11 at 2. 15 In response, Defendants argue that Hill’s concession that he did not plead injury in fact 16 requires dismissal rather than remand. Dkt. 14 at 17–21. Defendants contend that under the Ninth 17 Circuit’s “futility exception,” dismissal is warranted because the failure to plead injury in fact 18 defeats standing in Washington state court as well.

See id. at 18 (citing *Global Rescue Jets, LLC 19 v. Kaiser Found. Health Plan, Inc.*, 30 F.4th 905, 920 n.6 (9th Cir. 2022)). In reply, Hill 20 maintains that the futility exception is no longer good law, and even if it is, standing to sue for a 21 statutory violation under Washington state law is broader than the injury-in-fact analysis of 22 Article III. Dkt.

16 at 3–6. 23 Hill persuasively argues that this Court must remand his case for lack of subject matter 24 jurisdiction. The Supreme Court has made clear that under Article III, “a plaintiff does not 1 ‘automatically satisfy the injury-in-fact requirement whenever a statute grants a person a 2 statutory right and purports to authorize that person to sue to vindicate that right.’” *Robins v. 3 Spokeo, Inc.*, 867 F.3d 1108, 1112 (9th Cir.

2017) (quoting *Spokeo*, 578 U.S. at 341). “[E]ven 4 when a statute has allegedly been violated, Article III requires such violation to have caused 5 some real—as opposed to purely legal—harm to the plaintiff.” Id. Courts in this district have 6 both denied and granted motions to remand based on standing in cases brought under the 7 EPOA’s pay transparency provision.

What divides the denying and granting of those motions is 8 whether the complaint alleges a simple “violation of a statutory right” or an injury in fact. 9 Courts have found an injury in fact,

for example, when the complaint alleges harm 10 beyond just viewing a job posting or applying for the position. See, e.g., *Moquete v. GNC 11 Holdings, LLC*, No. CV24-05393 BHS, 2024 WL 4553690, at *2 (W.D.

Wash. Oct. 23, 2024) 12 (“Because Moquete applied for and obtained a position at GNC, her claims establish injury in 13 fact as required for Article III standing.”). 14 In contrast, motions to remand have frequently been granted when the complaint alleges 15 only the “violation of a statutory right” and no more. See, e.g., *Hill v. Spirit Halloween 16 Superstores LLC*, No. C24-1644 TSZ, 2024 WL 5117460, at *2 (W.D.

Wash. Dec. 16, 2024) 17 (“plaintiffs who alleged [solely] statutory violations of [RCW 49.58.110]... lacked Article III 18 standing and, as a result, [courts] granted remand”); *Atkinson v. Aaron’s LLC*, 733 F. Supp. 3d 19 1056, 1071 (W.D. Wash. 2024), modified on reconsideration, No. 23-CV-1742-BJR, 2024 WL 20 3199860 (W.D. Wash. June 26, 2024); *Floyd v. DoorDash, Inc.*, No. 23-CV-1740-BJR, 2024 21 WL 2325128, at *2 (W.D.

Wash. May 22, 2024); *Spencer v. Total Renal Care, Inc.*, No. C24- 22 1359RSM, 2024 WL 4834901, at *3 (W.D. Wash. Nov. 20, 2024); *David v. Wash. July 30, 2024). 16 Courts in this District have also remanded similar claims brought by Hill against other 17 defendants. See, e.g., *Hill v. Les Schwab Tire Ctrs. of Wash. LLC*, No. 24-CV-

425-BJR, 2025 18 WL 3062646, at *5 (W.D. Wash. Oct. 31, 2025) (“Mr. Hill has failed to plead such an injury. 19 Because a lack of Article III standing implicates the Court’s subject matter jurisdiction... this 20 case will be remanded to King County Superior Court.”); Hill v. ACV Auctions Inc., No. C25- 21 616 MJP, 2025 WL 1582249, at *3 (W.D.

Wash. June 4, 2025) (“Hill has failed to identify a 22 concrete and particularized injury sufficient to satisfy Article III standing. Because the Court 23 lacks subject matter jurisdiction, the Court GRANTS the Motion to Remand.”). 24 1 Here, Hill applied for a job but did not interview for it, engage in salary negotiations, or 2 otherwise experience concrete harm.

Dkt. 1-2 at 6. His case, like others that have been remanded, 3 alleges solely a “violation of a statutory right.” Spencer v. Vera Whole Health, Inc., No. C24-337 4 MJP, 2024 WL 3276578, at *2 (W.D. Wash. July 2, 2024). This is not enough to establish 5 standing under Article III, and without Article III standing, the Court does not have subject 6 matter jurisdiction.

Cetacean Cmty. v. Bush, 386 F.3d 1169, 1174 (9th Cir. 2004) (“A suit 7 brought by a plaintiff without Article III standing is not a ‘case or controversy,’ and an Article III 8 federal court therefore lacks subject matter jurisdiction over the suit.”). “If at any time before 9 final judgment it appears that the district court lacks subject matter jurisdiction, the case shall be 10 remanded.” Polo, 833 F.3d at 1196 (quoting 28 U.S.C. § 1447(c)).

11 A “narrow ‘futility’ exception to this general rule” allows a district court to dismiss the 12 case rather than remand it “if there is ‘absolute certainty’ that the state court would dismiss the 13 action following remand.” Glob. Rescue Jets, 30 F.4th at 920 n.6 (quoting Polo, 833 F.3d at 14 1197–98). Defendants ask this Court to dismiss Hill’s case under this narrow exception.

Dkt. 14 15 at 17. But as in Polo, it “is far from clear that a state court would dismiss” Hill’s claims. 833 16 F.3d at 1198. In Branson v. Washington Fine Wine & Spirits, LLC, the Washington Supreme 17 Court recently considered what a plaintiff must prove to be considered a “job applicant” entitled 18 to seek remedies under the EPOA. 5 Wn.3d 289, 292 (2025).

The Branson court held that “a 19 plaintiff must apply to a specific job posting but is not required to prove they are a ‘bona fide’ or 20 ‘good faith’ applicant to obtain remedies under the statute.” Id. Defendants contend that 21 Branson’s holding “does not change the analysis” because “nothing in the Branson decision 22 squarely addressed Washington’s injury in fact standing requirement.” Dkt.

14 at 22. But even if 23 Branson did not directly address standing under Washington state law, its discussion of who is 24 1 entitled “to obtain remedies under the statute” is broad enough to preclude a finding by this 2 Court that remand would be futile. See Branson, 5 Wn.3d at 292, 295-97, 304-05. 3 V. CONCLUSION 4 For the reasons explained above, Hill’s motion to remand is GRANTED.

The Court 5 ORDERS as follows: 6 1. Pursuant to 28 U.S.C. § 1447(c), all claims brought by Hill are REMANDED to 7 the Superior Court of King County, Washington; 8 2. Pursuant to 28 U.S.C. § 1447(c), the Clerk shall mail a certified copy of this 9 Order to the Clerk for the Superior Court of King County, Washington; and 10 3.
